2019 was the 17th year of Lunch Box serving meals on a Tuesday Lunchtime. It is now a well-oiled machine, maintained lovingly by 14 people on a weekly basis. 2019 was a good year when numbers of diners grew a little. We regularly serve 25 three- course meals and have a varied menu which is published well in advance. (See the notice in the Laburnum Room!)

There has only been one price rise in our lifetime, and the £3.50 consistently makes a profit for church funds and Lunch Box itself. (£1048.71 for each last year.) This is, of course, due to the members of the team who give their time and energy – and then buy their lunch!

Each week we have a raffle. This, over the months, raises a fair sum which enables both the Children's Holiday Club and Holiday at Home to be certain of paying for the coaches they book for outings and also offer the outings at a discounted price; an arrangement which has worked well since Holiday at Home was first set up. This year because we had a surplus of funds, we were able to organize a half day trip to include lunch at Kibworth Golf Club.

If you are free on a Tuesday lunch time and would like to share some company and a good meal, please feel free to join us. It would be really helpful, if you let either Irene or Dorothy know that you intend to come.

THE ELDER'S MEETING

It is the responsibility of the Elders to oversee all the activities of the church and to know that all activities are appropriate to take place on church premises. They also oversee that worship and work with children are properly arranged and must be sure that the finances of the church are kept in good order. They liaise with other local churches and keep up to date with the work of the Synod and General Assembly of the United Reformed Church.

All this is particularly important during a time of transition between ministers, and we are blessed to have church officers who care deeply about their tasks.

We began the year by giving thanks to Maurice Gardner for his long period of service as an Elder and Church Secretary. He had worked tirelessly for the church since his youth and still retains some tasks for our benefit. We also thanked Lyn Lakin for her period of service as Elder. Although quiet, Lyn had undertaken her role seriously, and usually worked in the background.

We welcomed back Paul Hadley, and also, Pam Smith, whose experience is valuable to us and Pam agreed to undertake the role of church secretary, although other Elders have shared the load by undertaking over some of the tasks.

During the year we have been focused on developing a Profile document which we believed would introduce ourselves honestly to any prospective minister who might want to learn about us. Finally, our efforts were accepted by the Synod Committee and our vacancy was declared for the November Moderator's meeting. We have worked through the re-application for the Child Friendly Church Award, which was successful, so the plaque can remain on our wall.

We have been concerned for the security of people in the building at times other than worship and have drawn up guidelines for all church user groups as well as for individuals.

WE received the Quinquennial survey of our building undertaken for us by the Synod, and now the Management Committee are exercised to act on its recommendations. The list was not too long!

A call Group was set up, to work with the South Leicestershire Group of Churches, to oversee and deal with the logistics of a call being given to a new minister.

We have worked well as a team and have also benefitted from using smaller groups to deal with individual topics.

As 2019 has come to an end we thank Alison Gardner for her period of service with us and we welcome Loretta Wilbond, as a new Elder as she begins to explore how her talents can be used to serve our Lord.

We now look forward to 2020 and, hopefully, developing a new relationship with the South Leicestershire churches as we continue to explore how a Resource Church will function. We pray God's blessing on our continued work.

Stay n Play runs on Thursdays during term time, 10 - 11.30 am! We occasionally meet during school holidays, when older siblings attend. Fees are £1.50 per family.

On register at the moment are 14 families (17 adults/21 children). We have a wide range of adults - parents, grandparents, great grandparents, aunts, childminder. Ages of children: womb -4yrs. Session comprises free play (covering all areas of development), crafts (sometimes adult crafts too) till 11am, then snacks and drinks, storytime/songtime. If weather ok, we use the outdoor area. Book Bus visits once per term.

Children feed into The Ark Preschool.

The Ark supports childminders with training when available. Visitors or volunteers always welcome!

2019 Holiday Club was another success! On the theme, Jesus the light of the world, 54 children aged between 3 and 11 enjoyed a week full of activity. 13 under fives had a room of their own but followed the activities going on in the big hall very closely; they joined in the singing and dancing, the story telling and craft activities with enthusiasm. 41 fives to elevens worked in groups to build lighthouses, aided and ably led by 5 young leaders. The older members of staff were able to take a more relaxed role because of their help. There was paint, glue, sticky tape, paper, felt tipped pens and scissors put to creative use as varied shapes of light house gradually took shape. Alison, too, was able to step back a little from the throng, to work with a group of 8 older young people who do not want to grow out of the Holiday Club week! They built the very large structure which stood at the front of the church for a few weeks.

An interested parent organized a visit to the Lifeboat station at Hunstanton which was enjoyed by all but the very youngest children. We basked in the sunshine and picnicked in the shadow of the Old Lighthouse, before families all went to enjoy the afternoon in their own way. Helpers enjoyed the stroll from one end of Hunstanton to the other, stopping for coffee at a number of tea rooms along the way!!

On the Sunday morning, breakfast was organized for children and their parents to come to prior to worship. This new venture brought 20 of the children and their families into the church for worship and the sharing of all that had gone on during the week with the congregation. Jesus certainly shone in our lives that week.

Over 50s Carers Group

The Over 50s Carers Group meets in the Laburnum Room, 10.30 am – 12.30pm on the first and third Fridays of every month. There is always tea, coffee, biscuits and often an excuse for cake. It is a friendly group and a safe place to talk.

It began seven years ago, with the assistance of Age UK, to support those caring for family members with Alzheimer's, dementia or life limiting illness. Carers were brought by volunteer drivers while the person they were caring for went to a day centre, hospice or was looked after by a befriender from Age UK. We were able to access the services of Age UK and Macmillan for advice and support.

We continued to run the Group after Age UK and Macmillan moved resources elsewhere, so we could give support and friendship to those Carers still in that role, those who had been bereaved, and those who had the person they had previously cared for now in residential care. People come and go as their situation changes.

There are at present eight members of the Group. A lady who for a long time was a member, who has moved from Leicester, often rings during the Meeting to keep in touch. We have links with a lady living locally who cares for her very elderly parents, and on occasion she has brought them to meetings.

In 2019 we celebrated Easter and Christmas, birthdays and anniversaries. The Christian Aid coffee morning always falls on a Carers' Friday but no one minds paying for their coffee on that occasion. There is always interest in what is going on at Church and we love to see the Ark children, particularly at their Christmas nativity play.

Sadly, we attended the funeral earlier in the year, of a lady who died of cancer, who came to the Group with her sister. Her sister has returned to the Group after a successful hip operation and now sometimes brings her son-in-law.

The Group is open to anyone over 50 who find themselves in a caring role. They can be sure of a warm welcome.

MANAGEMENT REPORT 2019

Management committee consists of Roy Hadley, Mark Hadley, Gus Webbe, John Allison and Rev Pam Smith with Irene Wren co-opted on. Assistance through the year was received from Paul Hadley and Gareth Hadley.

Part of the ceiling in the Laburnum room fell in during Januray. This was repaired and other plastering done at the same time.

A heater above the Abbots Road door was installed and we discovered that the Church electrics needed to be updated and this work was completed.

A P.A.T. test was also carried out on all electrical goods used in the Church and buildings and any items that did not pass were removed from circulation.

The toilets adjacent to the hall were not refurbished due in part to the firm that were going to undertake the work being about to enter liquidation. Further quotes will be sourced but the work can only go ahead during school holidays.

Various maintenance has been carried out as the need arose.

The Quinquennial Review was undertaken by a surveyor appointed by Synod. No major faults were found, although there is some general maintenance to be completed, none of this is urgent and will be dealt with before anything becomes urgent.

The Manse has a number of problems and I am happy to say that Irene Wren has agreed to oversee the organisation of getting these problems resolved.

My thanks go to all who have helped maintain and improve the Church and its' buildings.

Pilots

Pilots is a non-uniformed Christian organisation for children and young people. It is owned by the United Reformed Church. Pilots has been in existence since 1936. Pilots believes that children and young people matter. Therefore, Pilots gives local churches the chance to share the love of God in the ongoing life of Jesus Christ by inviting children and young people on an exciting journey.

Abbots Road Pilots – Each Monday evening is busy with 29 young people, 1 helper and 4 leaders on the premises at any one time. The programme is varied to cater for all types of needs. Our normal evening starts with a game followed by an activity, a drink and biscuit then Crest time, then a game and finally Pilots prayer.

Crest time is part of the National URC Pilots programme which consists of

Currently we are working on our prayer crest and to make this interesting we have taken this back to basics, therefore during January and February we are focused on the New Pilots prayer, Pilots promise, chain prayer Lord's prayer and Grace and discovering what they mean. The children are enjoying exploring these and have made varied items, for 'keep sake', so they can remember these more easily.

Whist we at Abbots Road have experienced steady numbers over the last ten years the same cannot be said for the National Pilots. With a drop in Pilots companies of over 60% the national Pilots are looking at new ways to be Pilots. Therefore, please hold Pilots as a national URC organisation in your prayers.
